

MEDALS DAY
PARADE FINBATT

FINBATT had its Medals Day Parade on 3rd June 1978. This year's celebration was a grand occasion for the Finns who were celebrating their Armed Forces' 60th Anniversary. It was a three day celebration beginning with a Dinner Party on Friday the 2nd of June. On 3rd June the festivities continued with beach parties, water skiing and other amusements followed by an oriental show and Sauna.

In the afternoon of the same day the Medals Day Parade which was to be the apex of the three-day celebration took place. It was a colourful and impressive ceremony. The salute was taken by the Force Commander, Major-General Rais Abin. In his address, the commander expressed his appreciation to the contingent for their dedication to duty. He said:

"I am very happy to be here with you on this eventful day. The presence of the Chief Coordinator, General Siilasvuo, Your ambassador to Cairo, His Excellency Mr Pekuri, and the Ambassadors of Australia and Sweden, their Excellencies Mr Ashwin and Mr Édelstam, certainly enhance this colourful parade. As you are aware a Medals Day Parade is a very important occasion for everyone serving with UNEF and today is even more important since this parade has been planned to concide with the Sixtieth Anniversary of the Finnish Armed Forces. May I congratulate you and I earnestly hope that the Finnish Armed Forces will always be in the front line of the bearers of the peace-keeping banner. I would like to take this opportunity to express my deep appreciation for the manner in which you have dedicated yourselves to the tasks entrusted to you. As the contingent farthest away from Headquarters you have often had to rely on resources available within your battalion and I must say that thanks to you and good leadership of the contingent, I have never had any reason to worry about this area".

The Commander congratulated members of the contingent and presented them with the UN Peace Medals on behalf of the Secretary General.

This year's celebration which attracted a large number of distinguished guests including UN Chief Coordinator, General Ensio Siilasvuo, and the ambassadors of Finland, Australia and Sweden continued into the night with a Dinner Ball and fireworks display.

On Sunday 4th June the guests were treated to a special luncheon and a tour of Abu Zenima and Wadi Garandal. The festivities ended with Sauna at Supatupa.

CANLOG held its Medals Day Parade on 7th May 1978 at El Gala. It was a great affair for the Canadians who, as luck should have it, were still celebrating their National Day. The occasion therefore was a grand finale for their week-long festivities.

Due to the intensively hot weather which made it practically impossible for any strenuous work to be done out of doors, the parade was held in the 114 ATU hanger, which served the purpose of a parade ground very well. The parade was attended by many distinguished guests, among whom were the Canadian Ambassador to Egypt His Excellency, Mr Dery, the Chief Coordinator, General Siilasvuo, and the Chief LAWIO General El Kateb.


The salute was taken by the Force Commander, Major-General Rais Abin. In his speech to the troops, the Commander welcomed the distinguished guests and praised the members of the contingent for the excellent manner in which they were carrying out their tasks. He said: "Today is a special day during your tour with UNEF. On behalf of the Secretary General I have presented you with the UN Peace Medals which you richly deserve.

The Commander concluded his speech by wishing them the best for the future and hoped they would complete their tour successfully.

Earlier during the parade the Commander on behalf of the Secretary General presented members of the contingent with the UN Peace Medals and congratulated them. As part of the function there was a brief ceremony during which Brigadier-General Baile handed over his duties as Commander of the Canadian contingent in the Middle East to Brigadier-General Evraire. Immediately after this General Evraire took over the command of the parade of the remaining part of it.

After the parade a reception was held for all the visitors, who had come to watch the parade, during which meals and a special barbeque were served. The celebration which continued to the late evening ended up with entertainment for the troops.

GHANBATT

GHANBATT was the last of the contingents to hold its Medals Day Parade in the month of July. It was a grand and impressive ceremony. Among the distinguished guests who came to witness the ceremony were Ghana's Minister Counsellor to the Arab Republic of Egypt, Mr Amoo, the Commander of UNIFIL, Major-General Erskine, and a special Armed Forces delegation from Ghana led by Colonel Agbotui, and the Director of the SFM.


The salute was taken by Major-General Rais Abin, the Force Commander. On behalf of the Secretary General, the Force Commnader presented the UN Peace Medals to members of the contingent and congratulated them on the award.

In his speech to the troops the Force Commander praised the contingent and assured them that the presentation of these awards was one of the most enjoyable duties that a Force Commander performs since it signifies an appreciation of the contribution the troops have made. He noted that the area occupied by the contingent was a sensitive and an import-ant one and said "I am happy to note that thanks to Lt-Col Achel's effective leadership you have remained physically active and with high spirits. I do not have to stress again the importance of your mission but would just like to repeat that the area under your control is a sensitive part of our Northern Buffer Zone and that your good understanding and working relationship with all the parties concerned, especially the SFM is our main concern.

You have done your job well and I wish you would continue to improve your performances for the good of our peace-keeping efforts in this part of the world. I trust you will finish your tour here successfully and return in the best of spirits".

The Commander concluded his address by extending a special welcome to the Minister Counsellor of the Ghanaian Embassy, Mr Amoo, the Ghana Army delegation led by Colonel Agbotui, and the Director of the SFM.

After the parade the guests were given a reception and dinner. An Egyptian entertainment troupe was at hand to provide music and belly-dancing to the spectators in the evening. The function was crowned with a dance at which the contingent's pop band "The Hot Barrels" provided music.

He enjoys hunting and sailing in his off-duty time. He is married and has three children.







A Guard Salutes as the members of the incoming Swedbatt march into Baluza Camp.





MILITARY PERSONNEL BRANCH

Lt-Col Aimo L.J. Lindfors, Finnisr Army, was assigned to UNEF on 4 June 1978 as Chief of the Military Personnel Branch at UNEF HQ.

He was born in the city of Turku in Finland on 8 October 1931. He graduated from the Finnish Military Academy in 1955 as a tank officer.

After his commission he served in the Tank Regiment as tank platoon commander up to a tank battalion second-in-command. He also served as an instructor in the Armour School. He did a stint as staff officer and branch head at the Armoured Brigade Headquarters. Before his present assignment with UNEF, he was a staff officer at the Headquarters of the South Finland Military Area.

On the basis of his experience Lt-Col Lindfors has written several pamphlets on rules and regulations on tank gunnery. For three years he acted as an editor of the Finnish tank magazine "Panssari".

His previous experience with the UN Operations includes a one-and-a-half-year (1971-73) tour with UNTSO as a military observer and Assistant Operations Officer and later as Officer-in-Charge of Ismailia Control Centre.

In 1975 he obtained his second degree: Doctor of Science and became Assistant Professor of Pharmacology in the Military Institute of Hygiene and Epidemiology in Warsaw.

He carried out scientific research in clinical and experimental pharmacology and biochemistry and published over 60 papers in Polish and international medical journals.

CAMP COMMAND

Lt-Col Juhani "John" Vikstrom has taken over the appointment of Camp Commandant UNEF HQ. Col Vikstrom was born on 10 October 1936 in Turku, Finland. 
UNEF continues to attract important visitors to the Mission Area and the months of June and July were no exceptions. In June Major-General Henuhili of the Indonesian Army, who is the officer responsible for National Reserves, paid an official visit to UNEF. He was accompanied by two staff officers from the Indonesian Army. At UNEF HQ he called on the Force Commander, Major-General Rais Abin, to have discussions with him. The visitors were later briefed by the Staff on UNEF Operations. He was taken to the Indbatt location in the Buffer Zone where he visited a number of Check Points and positions occupied by the contingent. Later he made a brief visit to Mitla, GHAN-BATT location. The visitors have since returned home.

Another group of important visitors to the mission area in June were a group of officers from the Canadian National Defence College. 

AMERICAN JOURNALIST VISITS UNEF

An American Journalist, Dr Harry May of the US Daily "The Tennessean", recently visited UNEF as part of his fact-finding tour of UN Peace Keeping Missions in the Middle East.

He said on his arrival that people in the US are somewhat ignorant about the work of the various UN Peace Keeping Missions in the Middle East and to a large extent are rather skeptical about their achievements. His paper therefore sent him to the various mission areas to find out what the peace-keeping forces are doing and to what extend they have achieved the aims and goals for which they have been sent down. As part of his tour he visited Israel, where he called at the Headquarters of UNTSO and also visited Lebanon to see UNIFIL at work, as well as Syria to see for himself what UNDOF was doing.

At UNEF HQ he had discussions with the Force Commander, Major-General Rais Abin, as well as the Chief of Staff Brigadier-General S. Nihlen and the Chief Administrative Officer Mr. P. Beirne.

FIRE OUTBREAK AT UNEF HQ

In the early hours of 5 July there was a fire outbreak in the Hammarskjold Mess. This fire would have led to a major disaster but for the prompt action of the HQ Fire Team and assistance from Ismailia Fire Station. By their help things were quickly brought under control and the fire soon put out. The cause of the fire was attributed to a leaking gas bottle in the mess kitchen.

Damage was quite extensive, kitchen ware, tables, and wall fittings were destroyed, and the mess had to close down temporarily to allow repairs to be carried out. It is estimated that repairs will be completed by the end of July and normal mess activities will be resumed thereafter.

We learned that the authorities have decided to employ a new system of gas connections in all kitchens and living accommodations in UNEF to prevent such accidents in the future. It is hoped that with this change such accidents will be reduced to the minimum.



THE MIDDLE EAST SIGNAL SEMINAR

Recently UNEF hosted a Signal Seminar for the various signal detachments in all the UN Peace Keeping Missions in the Middle East. Representatives from UNIFIL and UNDOF as well as all Signal Officers from all UNEF contingents attended the seminar which was held at UNEF HQ. Lt Col D.W. Edmunds was the chairman of the seminar.

The conference was formally opened by the Chief of Staff, Brigadier-General S. Nihlen. In his oepning address the chairman outlined the aim of the seminar which was to bring all signal officers in the Middle East together to get to know each other and discuss the problems facing their various contingents in their communication set-up.

After the opening address, the floor was declared open to all the participants to present papers on their communication

set-up, the problems they face and steps being taken to forestall these problems. Each presentation was followed by discussions and recommendations on any special problems facing a particular contingent.

At the end of the conference there was a reception for all the participants followed by a dinner at the 101 Mess in the evening.

THE FORCE COMMANDER VISITS GHANBATT B SWEDBATT

The force Commander, Major-General Rais Abin, visited GHANBATT and the SFM to inspect various Check Points within the battalion area and acquaint himself with operational and administrative difficulties facing the unit. He had discussions with the CO on operational and logistics matters and later on toured the unit area. He visited Check Points Alpha, Golf and Bravo. During the tour he noted the inaccessible nature of some of the Check Points and the acute shortage of transport in the unit. He directed that allocation of new vehicles to the unit should be undertaken by UNEF HQ as a matter of urgency and requested UNEF Engineers to take up improvement and repair of roads in the area. He also visited the Sinai Field Mission as part of his tour. The Commander was accompanied by a number of staff officers from UNEF HQ.

The Force Commander visited Swedbatt on 26th July 78. The first leg of his visit was to the Battalion Headquarters at Baluza where he inspected a colour guard. He later had discussion with the Contingent Commander Col S. Edgren. He also visited a number of checkpoints and positions occupied by the Contingent. On an earlier visit to Swedbatt the Commander met the Chief LAWIO and his party at check point 553 where they had discussions.

AUSTAIR COMPLETES TWO YEARS OF OPERATIONS BY FLT LT D.M. FIELDIWG-AUSTAIR

The months of July and August will see the contingent members of AUSTAIR celebrating the end of the contingents first two years of duty with UNEF.

According to the programme drawn up by the contingent, on 5th July 1978 the Commanding Officer, Wg Cdr G. Nicholson, together with the offices and Airmen of the contingent will celebrate the second anniversary of the arrival of the contingent in the Middle East, while on 1st August 1978 a dinner will be held to celebrate the end of the first two years of operational flying.

AUSTAIR members spend 6 months in service with UNEF, based at ISMAILIA, with the contingent accommodation being at the 'Sinai Palace Hotel'. Servicing and maintenance facilities for the contingent are based at the hangar, co-occupied with the Canadian 114 ATU, and the 'plastichut'

at EL GALA airfield.

The total strength of AUSTAIR is 47 Officers and men plus 4 UH-1H Iroquois helicopters. This total strength includes administrative and hygiene staff together with maintenance team required to complete all routine servicing on the aircraft.

The aircraft receive routine servicing and maintenance in the hangar at EL GALA and are then rotated in turn to Australia for major overhauls. Despite the harsh operating conditions in particular the very sandy environment the aircraft have had very few problems and rarely has a planned task had to be cancelled due to aircraft unservieability.

In the two years that AUSTAIR has been operating, there has been very little change in the contingent's roles if any. These include routine planned recce patrols, logistics support to buffer zone outposts, and medical evacuation. The greater proportion of the contingent's tasks are pre-planned on a monthly basis

Recce Flights. These are pre-planned and provide approximately two patrols per battalion each week. The aircraft are used to fly the UNMO's and battalion personnel on airborne patrols of the more inaccessible parts of the buffer zone.

Medical Evacuation. AUSTAIR maintains a 7 days a week, daylight hours only, search and rescue medical evacuation stand-by. In addition to this crew and aircraft, aircraft already on patrol in the buffer zone can be diver-

ted to carry out immediate search and rescue tasks.

Special Flights. AUSTAIR is often tasked with a number of special flights. These are usually VIP flights to convey the Force Commander and other important persons on inspections of the units in the buffer zone.

AUSTAIR operates throughout the entire buffer zone, covering weekly the areas occupied by SWEDBATT, GHANBATT' INDBATT and FINBATT. In any one week AUSTAIR pilots will have flown the entire buffer zone boundaries following the drums on the E, J and M lines and the coast to the north and south. In addition to the fenceline patrols the aircraft fly across the many thousands of rolling sand dunes that comprise the buffer zone. Operation within the zone are usually done at low altitude to enable the observers to get a better view of any tracks or strange markings in the sand.

Flying conditions vary throughout the year, though for the greater part of the year it is fine and clear with good visibility. Despite the generally good conditions, the occasional sand storms and the very hot days make flying a bit different from that encountered in Australia and add to crew fatigue that is common on the longer patrols. Navigation is a problem for the newcomer, there being a distinct lact of trees, railroads, rivers, towns, lakes

and other navigational aids: Despite these shortcomings the crews soon get to know the area and before long feel quite 'at home' in the desolate buffer zone. From reports in the AUSTAIR history sheets the only other hazards to flying appear to be the odd stray camel or high-flying Bedouin!

While the many users of AUSTAIRS services over the past two years are able to fully appreciate the role it has played in support of UNEF operations, those that have been less fortunate and unable to fly with AUSTAIR can gain some appreciation of what has been achieved in the past two years from the following collection of statistics. Since AUSTAIR started operations on 1st August 1976 the contingent's UH-1H helicopters have:

Flown 3,404.1 hours 5,628 sorties Carried 14,675 passengers 100,047 1bs freight

35 medical evacuations.

Though our road traffic accident statistics, as reported in 'SAND DUNE', do not appear to equate too well with the other contingents, we can certainly claim a good record in flying. For the past two years AUSTAIR has flown 490,190.4 kms without a single accident!



UN AGENCIES MEET AT UNEF






In the inter-contingent competition Swedbatt won the Gold Medal followed by UNEF HQ with Silver and Indbatt with Bronze.




Match for 4th and 5th places: Ghanbatt 4, Finbatt 1
